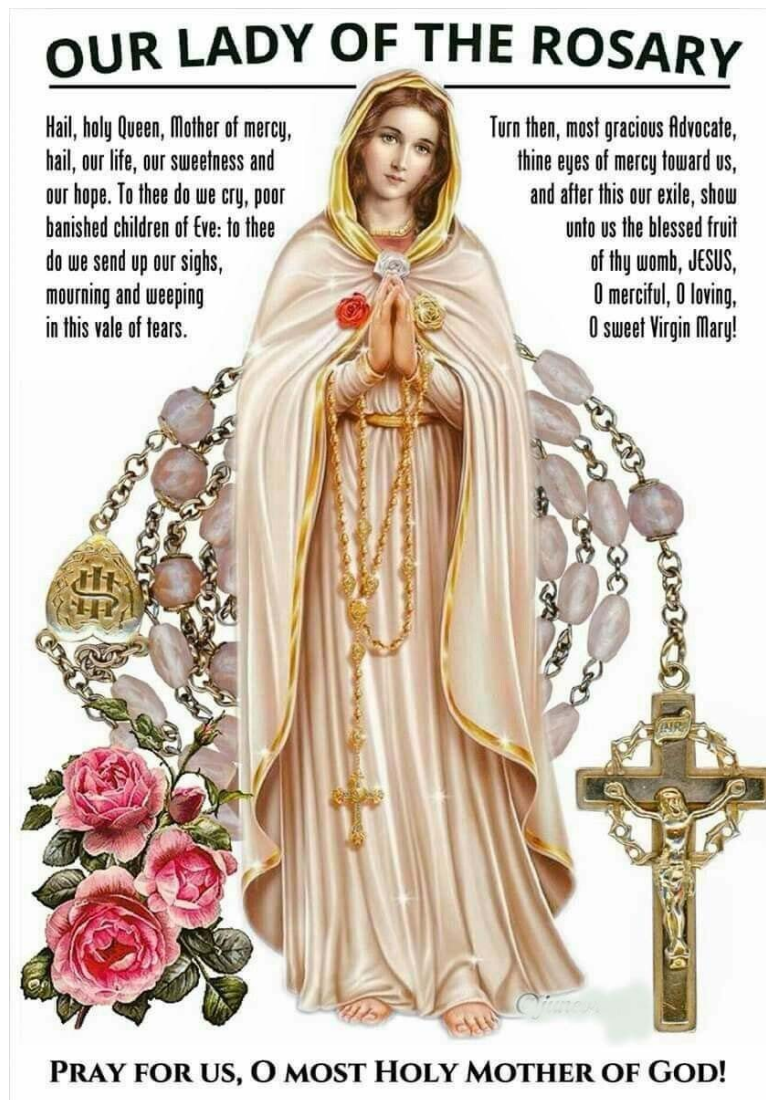

VISION

The little servants of Christ the King prayer community is a spiritual group within the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Sault Ste. Marie. It is incorporated and designated as a registered charity under the income tax act. Our goal is to advance and teach the Message of Jesus Christ as announced and practiced by the Catholic Church with an emphasis on having a personal relationship with Jesus and expressing the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Our time and resources are dedicated to the work of **EVANGELIZATION**.

In everything we do, everyone is invited from the different Sectors of our Diocese (English, French, and Native). Although, all our activities are conducted in English, we do everything possible to reach out to all.

Outside our weekly meetings, we use the Diocesan office, regular mail, E-mail (for approximately 350 members), phone calls, Facebook, YouTube, and our website for all our outreach.

The prayer community is divided into **THREE STREAMS**:

STREAM 1. Building our faith through Weekly prayer meetings and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist (Mass).

STREAM 2. Promoting Our Chapel of Perpetual Adoration of the Holy Eucharist.

STREAM 3. Teaching through special days of reflection.

- c.** Life in the Spirit and Future Growth seminars.
- d.** Special Fall Retreats.

Dear Leadership and members of the Charismatic Prayer Group,

Greetings in the name of the Lord.



My name is Fr. Christopher Oshalaiye, sma, working in the northern part of Benin republic, West Africa. I got your email address from Fr. Patrick Okenyi, sma who has really shown himself to be a big, caring and loving brother striving each day to help in the best way that he can, those of us in difficult missions. I must also mention that I have been a beneficiary of Mass intentions/stipends collected through your Prayer Group, of which I am still very grateful.

I have been in the northern part of Benin republic since 2015 after my priestly ordination, and presently I am working in the parish called our Lady of Lourdes in a village called Bougou, in the diocese of Djougou.

Bougou is a village almost 400kms from the big city of Cotonou. Presently, the village has a population of about 11,000 inhabitants, and it is a Muslim populated area having more than ten mosques and just a Catholic Church.

The parish was created in 2001, as such, next year she will be 20 years, which is still very young, meaning there is still a lot of work to be done. Notwithstanding, we are convinced that the Holy Spirit is still very much active. Attached to the main parish are 38 outstations, of which the farthest is 49kms from the main church. We have 35 catechists that assist us with prayers in the various communities, since it usually takes us a month to cover the entire 38 communities.

Also attached to the parish is a nursery, primary and secondary school called complexe scolaire catholique Esperance de Bougou, simply translates a Catholic school of hope. The school has been a great means of evangelization, since it attracts people from all religions. It is a Catholic school, yet the majority of our students are Muslims, since as I earlier stated, the area is Muslim populated.

CHALLENGES IN THE MISSION

1. The parish lack motor bikes for proper evangelization which is a necessity due to the bad state of the roads especially during the rainy season.
2. Majority of our catechists have no means of transportation, as such, they are obliged to walk for about 7kms to go pray with the people they have been assigned to.

3. The Church is lacking in sacred vessels and vestments for the celebration of the Eucharist.
4. The youth and children choir do not have musical instruments to help them properly praise and serve God using the talents that He has given them.

CHALLENGES IN THE SCHOOL

1. There is the problem of lack of payment of the school fee despite the willingness of the parents who are mostly farmers as such this prevents the proper running of the school due to lack of finance.
2. The school is in need of a photocopier machine and a printer and a computer that will be of great service to the nursery, primary and secondary school and will help serve extra expenses.
3. Also, due to the lack of payment mentioned earlier, there is a very big challenge in the payment of teacher's salary and getting the necessary equipment needed for the proper running of the school.
4. The nursery school is lacking in the area of chairs and tables which is a necessity for the children.

We are counting on your loving and generous hearts to help our parish and school continue the different work of evangelization the Lord has entrusted to us, and we will be delighted to have you participate in this mission of the Lord spiritually, morally and materially.

Once more, thanks a lot for the consideration and may God keep on blessing you, your families, and your prayer group.

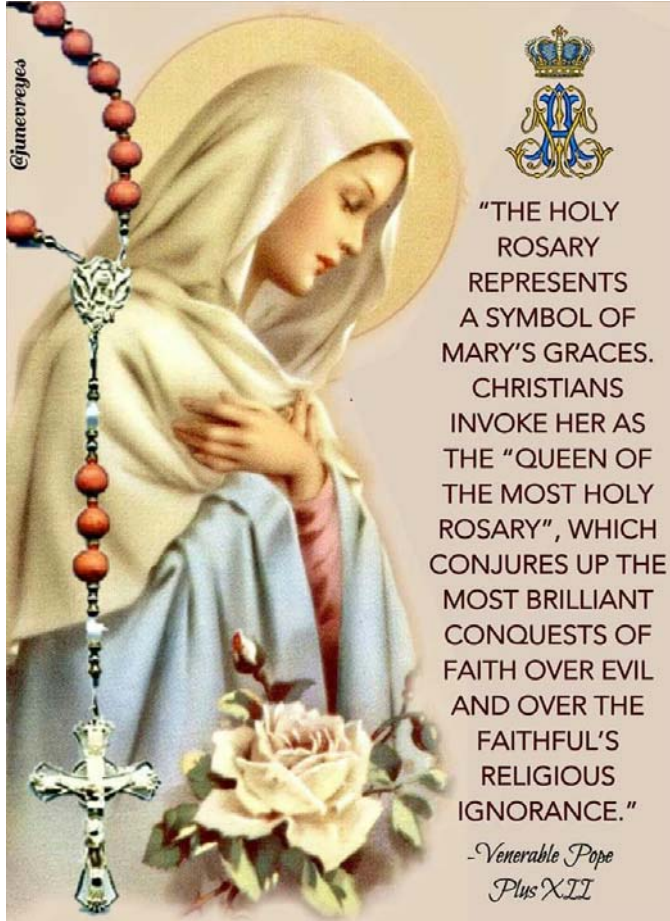

Sacramentals and the St. Benedict Medal

Last month you read about our beloved Saint Padre Pio. This month's article will be about sacramentals, and specifically the powerful St. Benedict medal. Sacramentals, both as blessings and objects, are discussed in the Catechism of the Catholic Church in numbers 1667 to 1679.

Sacramentals are sacred signs or objects which bear a resemblance to the sacraments. They signify effects, particularly of a spiritual nature, which are obtained through the intercession of the church. By them we are disposed to receive the chief effect of the sacraments, and our lives are rendered holy.

St. Benedict is the Patriarch of Western Monasticism and founder of the Order which bears his name. He was born in Italy in 480 and died in 547. His devotion to the cross gave rise to the medal of St. Benedict, which is above all, devotion to the cross by which Jesus defeated Satan. St. Benedict often employed the sign of the Cross to work miracles and to overcome the devil and his temptations, hence the idea of a medal was conceived. The numerous and extraordinary favours obtained by its pious use procured for it a wide and rapid spread in all parts of Europe. Finally, in 1741, Pope Benedict the XIV, moved by the many favours which God had shown through the Medal, solemnly approved it and enriched it with many indulgences.



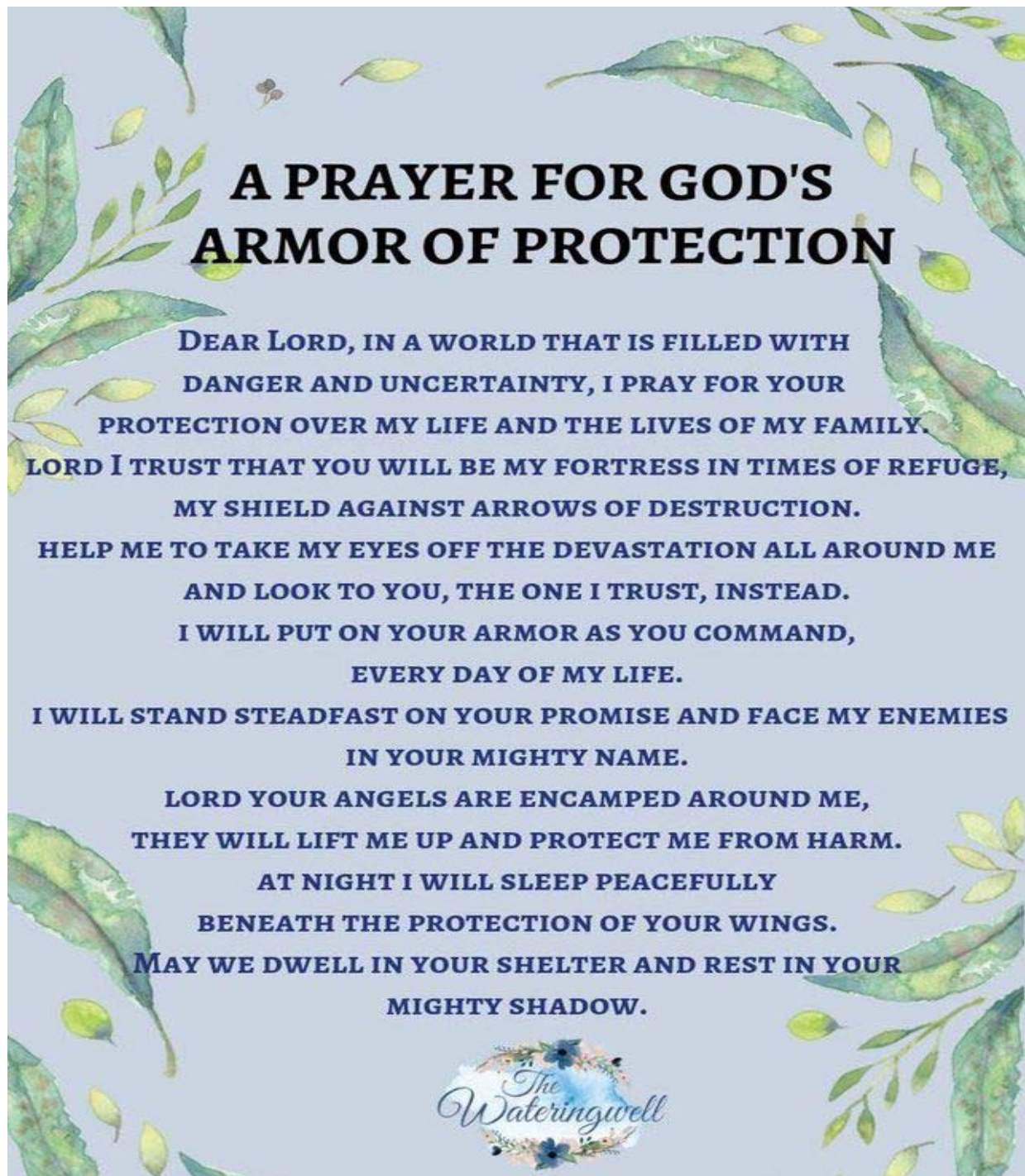
The many letters and symbols stand for the words "May the Holy Cross be my light," and "Let not the Dragon be my guide," and "Begone Satan". Suggest not to me your vain things. The cup you offer to me is evil. Drink the poison yourself," and "At our death may we be protected by the presence of St. Benedict." No special way of using the Medal is prescribed. It may be worn around the neck, attached to the Scapular or Rosary, or otherwise carried about one's person. It may be touched to the water or medicine given to the sick, or may be applied to their wounds. Often it is placed in the foundations of houses, hung over the doors or on the walls of dwellings, stables, barns, or attached to cars, to call down God's blessing and the protection of St. Benedict, and the power of the Church's blessing. Also, no particular prayers are prescribed, as the devout wearing is itself a continual silent prayer. In time of temptation, it is advisable to hold the medal in one's hand, kiss it reverently and pray.

The salutary effects of the Medal are produced through the Passion of our Lord, the merits and intercession of St. Benedict, and the blessing of the Church. In the blessing God is implored to preserve those who wear the Medal from all the snares and temptations of the devil; to protect them from lightnings and tempests, from pestilences, sicknesses and

poisons; and to bestow upon them His blessings, both temporal and spiritual. Twice the Church repeats the request that they may escape the snares and deceits of the devil, which seems to be the chief purpose of the Medal. Innumerable facts attest that the pious use of the Medal, with the invocation of St. Benedict, has at all times been most powerful in warding off all dangers of body and soul, and in procuring for us temporal and spiritual favours.

With all the recent natural disasters brought about, the Medal is a divine protective measure.

TAKEN BY SURPRISE – THE ST. BENEDICT MEDAL

August 15, 2020.

It happened in July 2017. A miracle occurred to me with the St. Benedict medal. After experiencing years of spiritual oppression ministering on a poor mystical island named Ilin in the Mindoro region of the Philippines, I was searching for additional spiritual aid to rescue me in this fight against evil spirits and witchcraft, of which I had been a victim. Being hospitalized for the fourth time in three years due to dehydration from poisonous food and an evil presence, I turned to St. Benedict for help. I was never one to wear medals around my neck, however, I decided I wanted to add to the cross I had been wearing, a St. Benedict medal. When I slipped on the



medal, the clasp of the chain snapped after 15 years on my neck! After fixing it, I reinserted the medal onto the chain and again the clasp broke after a day. Then I put tape around the clasp so it wouldn't come apart, but when I woke up the following morning, the medal once again fell to the tile floor with a 'ding, ding ding' sound and no sign of how it could possibly have come off my neck?... I was puzzled. So I removed the tape and slid the medal onto the chain, with the intention of taping it more securely, however,

when I attempted to fit the medal onto the loop, the medal was too big!! Or, the loop, it seemed, was now too small. "What?" I said to myself, "why doesn't it fit?" This was my fourth try and there was never a problem before. For over five minutes I sat trying to make the medal slide onto the chain like before, but it just wouldn't fit. I said to myself, "this is impossible!" And then it dawned on me... I realized that a bad spirit was actively preventing me from wearing this medal. I could sense his evil presence and so I went to our Bishop, Antonio Palang, who makes medal rosaries in his spare time. He took his pliers and permanently attached the medal onto the chain and fixed the broken latch and then slipped it over my head and said... "You will need this!" Grateful for his love and concern, I immediately searched about more information on St. Benedict. I read, "St. Benedict is the patron saint against witchcraft and poisonous food!" Wow! No wonder God lead me to St. Benedict!!

From that time onward, I have been free of all ailments pertaining to food up to this day. No more have I been hospitalized due to severe dehydration! God gave me a gift of protection to combat evil and to strive ahead confident that He will always "deliver me from evil". I have begun distributing to people the medal in a small package with a prayer for healing inside from our late Founder, Fr. Fernando Suarez. One day, it was placed on the daughter of a friend of a board member of our Foundation, Mary Mother of the Poor, and immediately the little girl's fever disappeared!

The weight of evil is all around us, especially in this day and age, and we need all the help we can get. The St. Benedict medal, which traces its roots back to the fourth century, is not an amulet or medallion, but rather a powerful sacramental that requires faith for its effectiveness. There is no power on its own. Let us be encouraged that our saints in heaven are ever ready to assist us in prayer, as we journey onward as the pilgrim church on earth. St. Benedict of Nursia, pray for us!

Letter from Jean-François Bergeron, sma



Dear friends and benefactors,

In our last circular, we wished you a fruitful Lent and a good climb towards Easter. But, with this Covid-19 pandemic which has come to turn our lives upside down, Easter was celebrated in a very different context this year, a little as if Lent had been extended for an indefinite period. We would therefore like to assure you of our humble daily prayers for your intentions during this difficult time, and especially for the intentions of the elderly and people with more fragile health. Please also be assured of our daily prayers for all those who have passed away. May the Lord welcome them in His eternal love.

On the other hand, we recently received news that was both heartening and inspiring from Rome. Our founder Bishop Marion de Brésillac, founder of the Society of African Missions (SMA), was declared "venerable" by the Vatican, which praised his "heroic virtues" as a missionary. This is the first step towards his beatification and, eventually, towards his canonization, which would elevate him to the rank of "Saints" of the Church. Let us ask him to intercede for us and to help us be better missionaries of the gospel!

Also, this year in our Society of African Missions (the SMA Fathers) we are celebrating 32 priestly ordinations and 18 diaconal ordinations. Of those who will be ordained priests, 28 are from Africa and 4 are from India. Among the deacons, there are two Indians and 1-6 Africans. All were ordained deacons on June 25 in Ivory Coast. Let us give thanks to God for the succession He gives us and ask Him to guide our young priests and deacons in their future missions.

Due to Covid-19, some of our projects with the Roncalli Foundation have been put on hiatus for the year 2020. However, we are continuing our plan to send medical equipment and used cars for our missionaries in Africa. We are in the process of preparing, through the CSI (Collaboration Santé Internationale), a container of 20 medical beds, with an ultrasound machine, a mobile X-ray machine, medicines, a generator and, above all, health equipment to deal with the pandemic which is also spreading in Africa. This container will leave in September for northern Benin, where government and church authorities are equipping a referral hospital to serve this region of the country. As for the four used cars sent to our missionaries in Africa, the money will be returned to us so that we can send another container in its place and so on. This is a self-financing project - at least that's what we hope.

Dear friends and benefactors, we thank you very much for your generosity and your donations which make all these projects possible. May this return to school 2020, despite the unusual health situation we are experiencing, keep you safe. And may Our Lady of the Assumption grant you and all our students and workers her maternal protection!

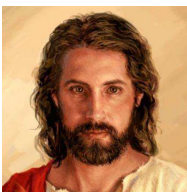
